

Why JobSeeker, Youth Allowance and related payments need to increase

Key facts August 2024

Why JobSeeker and related payments need to be substantially increased

- There are more than one million people receiving JobSeeker, Youth Allowance and related payments that are well below all measures of adequacy including poverty lines (EIAC, 2024¹; DSS March 2024).
- The single rate of JobSeeker Payment is just \$55 a day. Youth Allowance is even less at \$45 a day. This compares with the pension at \$80 a day, and the minimum wage of \$130 per day (before tax).
- JobSeeker Payment is 42% of the minimum wage.
- JobSeeker Payment continues to be the lowest unemployment payment in the first two months of unemployment in the OECD (EIAC, 2024).
- In <u>late 2023, the OECD recommended Australia</u> lift unemployment payments highlighting that they 'remain below the relative poverty line'.
- In 1993, JobSeeker Payment was the equivalent of 90% of the Age Pension. Today, it's 69%. It is \$172 a week less than the pension (see graph 1 below).
- JobSeeker Payment is not a short-term payment. Almost 70% (547,000) of people receiving JobSeeker have received income support for 12 months or more (DSS, 2024).
- The median asset value held by someone receiving JobSeeker Payment is \$4,500 (EIAC 2024).
- Our latest report on how people receiving JobSeeker and Youth Allowance are faring found:
 - 94% of people renting privately are in rental stress, paying more than 30% of their income on rent.
 - 64% are eating less or skipping meals while 71% are cutting back on meat, fresh fruit, vegetables and other fresh items.



- 68% are cutting back on heating or cooling their homes, 54% are cutting back on using lights, and 50% are taking fewer hot showers
- \circ $\,$ Three quarters had trouble affording the medicine or medical care they needed.
- 92% said that the low rate of income support harmed their mental health and 88% said it harmed their physical health.
- 81% said they use their car less than normal, and a further 9% don't use their car at all. 65% had difficulty getting to work or appointments.
- The <u>Australian Institute of Health and Welfare</u> found that suicide rates among people receiving JobSeeker and the Disability Support Pension are much higher than the broader population. People who received unemployment payments accounted for 20% of all suicides in 2019 for people aged 15-66 years.

Key ask

 ACOSS calls for JobSeeker, Youth Allowance and related payments to be increased to at least \$80 a day, in line with the pension, and indexed to wages as well as prices.
